Determined Admission Arrangements Lordswood School for the Academic Year 2022/2023

1. Children reach compulsory school age at the start of the term following their fifth birthday. Lordswood School will admit 4 year-olds into its Foundation Stage class, ie those children born between 1 September 2017 and 31 August 2018.
2. Parents/carers need to complete the Medway Common Application Form in accordance with the co-ordinated scheme. For further information and an application form please contact Medway Council's Student Services Operations Team on 01634 331155 www.medway.gov.uk/admissions.
3. Parents/carers are not obliged to start their child at school until the beginning of the term after the child is 5. Therefore, parents/carers who have been offered a September place may ask to defer their child's admission until later in the school year or until the child reaches compulsory school age in that school year without losing the offer of a place. Parents/carers can also request that their child attends part-time until the child reaches compulsory school age. Parents/carers of children with summer term birthdays (1 April to 31 August 2017) may ask to start their child in Year 1 in September 2021 but the Reception place will not be saved. Parents/carers will have to reapply for a Year 1 place. Parents/carers are not able to defer entry beyond the beginning of the term after the child's fifth birthday.
4. The Published Admission Number for Lordswood School is 60.

Oversubscription Criteria

Following receipt of parental/carer preferences, places will be offered to those children with statements of special educational needs where Lordswood School is named. Then, if the number of requests received via the coordinated scheme is more than the number of places available, places will be allocated in the following priority order:

Children in public care -as defined in the Medway co-ordinated admission scheme, including previously looked children, who are now adopted.

1. A 'looked after child' or a child who was previously looked after but immediately after being looked after became subject to an adoption, child arrangements, or "special guardianship order" including those who appear to Lordswood School to have been in a state of care outside of England and ceased to be in a state of care as a result of being adopted.

A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989). *An adoption order is an order under the Adoption Act 1976 (see Section 12 adoption orders) and children who were adopted under the Adoption and Children Act 2002 (see Section 46 adoption orders). A ‘child arrangements order’ is an order settling the arrangements to be made as to the person with whom the child is to live under Section 8 of the Children Act 1989 as amended by Section 14 of the Children and Families Act 2014. Section 14A of the Children Act 1989 defines a ‘special guardianship order’ as an order appointing one or more individuals to be a child’s special guardian (or special guardians).

2. Children with a current family association (a brother or sister, including adopted, foster and step siblings) in the school at the time of application and still attending in September 2021).
3. Children with health reasons. Medical evidence must be provided which demonstrates a specific health reason, which requires a child to attend Lordswood School.
4. Multiple birth children, as defined in the Medway co-ordinated admission scheme.
5. Children of teaching staff.
6. Nearness of child’s home to school measured using Medway Council’s criteria. Where criteria involves measuring distance to a child’s home, the Local Authority’s procedures for ascertaining the shortest available safe route between home and the school will be used. Proof of residence will be required by the co-ordinated scheme. The offer of a place may be withdrawn if proof of residency is not met. Where a child lives part of the week with one parent and part with another member of the family, the ‘home address’ will be considered to be the residence where the child spends at least three nights of the school week each week.

In cases of over subscription, parents can ask for the children’s names to be placed on a waiting list held by Lordswood School. The children will be ranked according to the school’s over subscription criteria and the Local Authority co-ordinated scheme and not according to the date when the child’s name was added to the list.

Tie-breaker

In the unlikely event that two or more children in all other ways have equal eligibility for the last available place at the school, the names will be issued a number and drawn randomly to decide which child should be given the place.

Casual Admissions

Parents/carers need to complete the Casual In-Year Admission Form and places will be offered in accordance with the co-ordinated scheme. Parents can apply for a casual admission at any time during the school year.

- If no places are available at the time of application, a waiting list will be maintained.
- Names are kept in priority order according to the oversubscription criteria and not according to how long a child’s name has been on the list.
- Any place that becomes available will be offered to the child at the top of the list.
- All vacancies will be allocated as they arise.

Casual Admissions when transferring schools without moving home

If a parent/carer wishes to transfer their child from another school without moving home, the Head teacher will contact the child's current school to ascertain the situation so that our school is able to offer the correct support should the child be offered a place. It is also expected that the parent/carer of the child, along with the child themselves when appropriate, visit our school and meet with the Head before any place will be offered.

Appeals

Parents/carers have the right to appeal to the school if a place is not offered to their child. Appeals will be handled in line with the School Admissions Appeals Code. Parents wishing to appeal should write to the school. The Office of the Schools Adjudicator will take complaints about the schools' admission arrangements.
