British Values

The DfE has recently reinforced the need "to create and enforce a clear and rigorous expectation on all schools to promote the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs."

The government set out its definition of British values in the 2011 Prevent Strategy, and these values have been reiterated by the Prime Minister. At Lordswood School, these values are reinforced regularly through the curriculum and assemblies Our teaching and learning goals are underpinned by our own School Values.

Throughout the school, British Values are promoted in a wide variety of ways. Below are just some aspects of school life that enable children to understand these fundamentals as they move on through their time at school.

Democracy is also promoted through additional PSHE lessons and assemblies ("Being Me in My World" unit). This is recognised through such things as Super stars, Gold book, House awards and our Lordswood passport. Through our school assemblies, circle time and PSHE children are taught how to earn trust and respect and are supported to develop a strong sense of morality; knowing right from wrong and doing the right thing even when it's difficult ("Relationships" unit).

- The local police officer / PCSO visit the school to talk to the children and explain about their role in society.

UN CRC Article 31: All children have a right to relax and play, and to join in a wide range of activities.

UN CRC Article 15:

Children have the right to meet together and to join groups and organisations, as long as this does not stop other people from enjoying their rights.

- Through our school values and the JIGSAW PSHE program, children are taught about personal responsibility, choices, ambition and aspiration. They are encouraged to take opportunities to follow their interests in art, music, sport etc ("Dreams and Goals" unit).
- Children are taught how to keep themselves safe, including on-line. This is done through termly E-Safety lessons, assemblies and outside organisations such as the NSPCC, the Fire service, as well as through the PSHE curriculum.
- Children are taught about the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child and learn to respect their rights and the rights of others.

UN CRC Article 2: The Convention applies to everyone whatever their race, religion, abilities, whatever they think or say and whatever type of family they come from.

- We have high expectations about pupil conduct and this is reflected in our Relationship Policy, Equal Opportunity Policy and through the (SWPBS) School Wide Positive Behaviour support framework.
- Children are taught about the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child and learn to respect their rights and the rights of others.
- Through our school's values, PSHE scheme, and circle time, children are taught to respect each other, to be cooperative and collaborative, be supportive and to look for similarities while being understanding of differences.
- The PSHE theme of "Celebrating Differences" explores these issues well.
- Mutual respect is also promoted through additional PSHE lessons and assemblies. A

UN CRC Article 14:

Children have the right to think and believe what they want, and to practise their religion, as long as they are not stopping other people from enjoying their rights. Parents should guide their children on these matters.

- We have high expectations about pupil conduct and this is reflected in our Relationship Policy and Equality, Diverse and Equal opportunities Policy.
- All staff have completed Prevent training.
- Tolerance of different faiths and beliefs is promoted through the Religious Education. curriculum. Children learn about different religions, their beliefs, places of worship and festivals. The children's work on this subject or whole school learning in assemblies is often displayed in the classrooms or around the school.
- Significant religious festivals such as Ramadan and Diwali are also celebrated within school.
- Visits are made by local religious leaders and children have the opportunity to visit places of worship.
- Children are taught about the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child and learn to respect their rights and the rights of others.
- We provide extra support for children who are taking part in religious practices e.g. fasting
